As is our tradition, our December meeting will feature an **open mic session** in which members and guests will have the opportunity to share a little of their work with us.


#### OUR NEXT ALTERNATE MEETING!



#### FEATURED BOOK REVIEWS

This month we have one new review, and then we'll continue with our usual order.

#### The Watchmaker's Mouse

Gertrude the mouse lives in the watchmaker's shop and over time has become friends with him. Yet, feelings she hardly recognizes cause her to leave and discover a bigger world outside. While on her quest, she learns about her family, her kind, and the dangers they face in everyday life. The other mice, in turn, learn of the trust and care that can exist between creatures of different kinds, as exemplified by her and the watchmaker.


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The story is very well written and illustrated. Some illustrations are by the author, while the colored images were created by a friend, Debbie Hughbanks. It is created as, and presented as a children's story, yet it's worth reading from an adult viewpoint. Anyone with an ounce of sentimentality will find their eyes misting and a lump in their throat. Very highly recommended for children (and adults) of all ages.

This is an informative, educational, and entertaining book. With candor, a bit of humor, and at times the right amount of selfdepreciation, the author relates his wartime experiences in a relatively unknown operational area.

For most Americans, World War II was an "overseas" war, with little thought given to fighting on our own continent, yet early in the conflict, Japan attempted to establish a foothold on the North American continent. On the leading edge of a thinly spread defense, Navy patrol planes fought the enemy, operated from primitive bases, and endured some of the worst weather imaginable. With the Navy's "can-do" attitude, American "know-how," ingenuity, and personal courage, they succeeded.


Those Navy Guys and Their PBY's is Elmer Freeman's personal accounting of the little known and often overlooked war in Alaska's Aleutian Islands. Having enlisted in the Navy prior to America's entry into the war, he went to school to become an Aviation Machinist Mate. Early on he was in the beaching crew that retrieved his squadron's PBY seaplanes from the water. Gaining experience, he became part of a flight crew. During Freeman's advancement to senior enlisted man (plane captain) aboard the aircraft, the United States became involved in World War II. Operations shifted from the Seattle area to the Aleutians to prevent Japanese forces from establishing a presence in North America. That effort was not entirely successful, as the enemy did for a time occupy two islands in the chain.

This is not only Freeman's story, but that of all men of the Navy's Patrol Plane Squadrons that took part in the campaign. It also pays tribute to Army and Army Air Force personnel who played an equally important role.

Those Navy Guys and Their PBY's is richly illustrated with dozens photographs and maps, both from the author's collection and other accredited sources. Self-published, a second printing of the revised edition occurred in 2002. ISBN 0-9632463-1-3 sells for \$18.95 (plus \$3.00 shipping) and is available form Kedging Publishing Company, 1124 W. 8<sup>th</sup> Ave., Spokane, WA 99204

## III Minutes To XII: The Last Secrets of the Bible

How long ago were Adam and Eve on the Earth? Where was the Garden of Eden? What really happened when Cain killed Abel? Were angels really spiritual beings, or were they aliens from an advanced civilization? These are some of the questions the author asks and attempts to answer based on his research of the Bible, ancient monuments is South and Central America, and noncanonized texts from long ago. He also looks at future possibilities as revealed by the research he has done.


This volume fits in with those who believe or suspect the presence of aliens from far away worlds in the earliest eras of man's history on earth. It also offers something to those who feel there is more to the stories told in Genesis and other Books of the Old Testament.

It does, however, take some work to read this book. There is a lot of repetition of Biblical and other verses, which slows down the process of determining the overall message. While quoting these passages, the author has parenthetically inserted words or terms to help clarify meanings. After several repeated insertions, most readers instinctively understand the duality, and additional words or phrases are now distracting.

If we can make it through these obstacles in reading, we find an alternate

explanation of early Earth history that makes some sense. Yet, much of what is suggested does not fit with what science currently tells us to be true. It is possible of course; that what we think we know is in error, and then all of this would mesh.

The possibilities suggested by this book are fascinating and the author is to be commended for his single-minded dedication and research. However, the information could have, should have been presented in a much smoother and easier to read fashion.



*Truths and Lies* by Elena S. Smith is an absolutely enthralling read. Vicki is a university professor and considers herself a lucky lady. She thought her life was over when she got divorced, but now she is happy and enjoys her freedom, independence, and a life free of lies and manipulation. But her best friend, Darlene, is not convinced and decides to make Vicki a profile on a dating site. When Vicki sees the guy she splashed with beer at a Seahawks game a while ago, she decides to give him a chance. Tom is a lonely guy in his late 50s. He

has been divorced for almost a decade and stopped taking care of himself. Tom believes he is a decent man who doesn't deserve to be manipulated and deceived. He is afraid of getting hurt again, but after a brief encounter with a woman at a football game, he starts to believe that it is still possible to find a soulmate.

I did not expect such a fascinating and uplifting contemporary romance novel. *Truths and Lies* by Elena S. Smith is the perfect combination of fun, adventure, peace, love, tenderness, care, and intimacy. It's about truths and lies, freedom and commitment, trust, loss, and survival. Elena writes so well that she draws you into her characters' lives. Her characters are realistic and wonderfully flawed. Their fears and experiences with truth and lies allowed me to connect deeply and relate to them. Vicki is now one of my favorite female characters. I highly recommend this moving novel to all readers looking for a mature romance with strong characters.



Walking Sticks is Joyce Wilkens' second coffee table book. I especially like her clever subtitle Wanderings and Wonderings. This book tells the history of walking sticks around the world. Some of them are crooked, some are straight; some are perfectly carved with delicate shapes, interesting faces, or with animals sitting at their tops-one is even a snake with the top of its body looped around for a handle; and some have messages burned into them or they are painted or adorned with beadwork. They are made from many different types of wood and materials. Her book is truly a work of art with many beautiful pictures showing the sticks themselves and the locales from which they came. I enjoyed the writings and the wonderful poems, often by Joyce herself. I highly recommend this book for all. It's a great book. It made me want to get a walking stick myself-preferably one with a carved animal at its top.
