


FROM YOUR EDITOR, WEB-MASTER, TREASURER

This month I'm going to step away from my usual exhortations to pay dues and such. Instead, I'll post something I wrote long ago and found in my files regarding self-publishing.

Why Self-publish?

Since the self-publishing writer pays to produce his or her book, why on earth would anyone choose to do that? Why not let a publisher pay the costs, sit back, and wait for those fat royalty checks to

come rolling in?

There are probably as many answers to this as there are self-published authors. The short and perhaps snarky answer is that the self-published author could not find anyone willing to publish his or her work. At this time members of the ASPF (Anti Self-Publishing Faction) join in and insist that work is self-published because it isn't good enough for "real" publication. Self-published or not, we've all seen books that should have remained in the author's lower desk drawer or within his computer files. The volume should not have seen the light of day nor should eyes, other than the author's, ever beheld its ink-stained pages.

Many factors beyond quality determine whether a book gets published in the traditional sense. Very few books out of the great many written are ever published. To illustrate, let's consider ten thousand writers with manuscripts they would like to have published. They soon learn that all but the smallest independent presses will not talk to un-agented, unknown, and unpublished writers. Looking for representation, these folks send out query letters or attend conferences and pitch to agents. After a while we find that a thousand of these aspiring authors now have literary representation.

These agents, acting and on behalf of the writers they represent, pitch the books to acquisition editors, the front-line buyers for the various publishing houses, book lines or imprints. Allowing sufficient time to pass, we find that a hundred of the books have been picked up or acquired. The editors take the works they have acquired to an editorial board, senior editor, or other decision-making entity at the publisher where they work and attempt to persuade said entity to publish those books. In our straightforward and mathematically precise example, we find that ten books are selected for publication.

We started with ten thousand books, and ten got the nod for production. That is *point one percent*. As time goes on, more of the un-agented nine thousand writers may gain representation, a small portion of the un-acquired nine hundred manuscripts might get

picked up, and some of the ninety un-chosen works may receive a publishing contract. Still, the number of published books compared to those written is very small, with the figure of three percent often mentioned. Can the ninety-seven percent that are not selected all be so terrible that they do not deserve to be published?

Cost of Printing

Most of you are aware that come June 20th, Amazon is raising the cost of printing. You can go to your account to see what the new printing cost would be. If it goes up significantly, you might want to reprice your book(s) to keep your royalties at about the same level as now. For what it's worth, it appears the printing costs of each of my three books will go up by about fifteen cents. At this point I don't see a need to change my prices.



OUR MAY 2023 MEETING

Friday May 12th saw Spokane Authors and Self-Publishers meet for the second time at the Corbin Senior Activity Center. Attending were: Caryl Briscoe-Michas, Beth Camp, Larry Danek, Mary De Bord, Sue Eller, Esther Hildahl, Bob Hildahl, Marilee Hudon, Dave McChesney, Rich McKay, Carl Northrup, and Kate Poitevin. Guests included but were not limited to: Bob Slack and Jennifer Day, both of whom later joined the group. Also there was Carolyn, a relative of Sue Eller's and at least one other individual whose name we did not catch.

Because of the change in the day of our meetings, the speaker that had originally been scheduled was unable to appear. Fellow SASP member Dave McChesney volunteered to fill in and spoke about the type of stories he writes, which is Age of Sail/Naval Adventure with a slight touch of Science Fiction. He

talked about, compared, and contrasted two of the writers in Naval Adventure that have influenced him. Those would be C. S. Forester, creator of the Horatio Hornblower series of books, and Patrick O'Brian, author of what most people refer to as the Master and Commander stories. Dave also offered a little insight into the practice of arming warships with more guns than their official rate. Finally, he provided definitions and explanations for a few of the nautical terms that might be found in his Stone Island Sea Stories.

Following a short break, we resumed with a brief business meeting. We agreed to form a refreshment committee to share the responsibilities of bringing snacks and drinks. Jennifer Day, Kate Poitevin, Beth Camp, Marilee Hudon, and Caryl Briscoe-Michas volunteered to serve on that committee.

Marilee said she knew someone who was looking for someone to print an illustrated children's book. She also noted that we were signed up for the first four weeks of the Garland Street Summer Market, beginning on Thursday May 25th. Members participating include: Sue Eller, Larry Danek, Beth Camp, Dave McChesney, Bob Slack, Marilee Hudon, and Carl Northrup. 


Ms. Carter has written a good story. If you like romance books, this book is for you.



I initially bought this book for my granddaughters: ages 4, 6 & 9, but I wanted to read it first. Before I knew it, I was laughing at the wonderful characters this author created from no less than flies, a spider & even a praying mantis!

It is a wonderful story of how Poopy, the bluebottle fly, survives various near-death experiences, including - but not limited to - being eaten alive to getting trapped in a dark, spooky spider-filled forest to standing up to a bully as he discovers his inherent worth. He survives because he listens raptly to his teacher to "be aware of your surroundings" always and to trust your instincts.

Not only does this story keep you on edge, wondering if Poopy will make it, it teaches many scientific facts about ants,

butterflies, spiders and, of course, flies. It teaches children (and adults) that flies (and other insects) are not ALL bad, but sometimes do honorable things like help a friend, inspire others, and even pollenate flowers! I even believe that children will love the main character so much because of their love of the word "poop" and bathroom jokes, because the author never shrinks from telling it like it is, ie., flies like poop!

On her way to the initial activation of the system, Becky disappears and earth-changing events begin to occur.


This small book, which can be read in a fraction of the time required for most, packs an amazing story into a relatively small package. There is an understated but noted parallel with Biblical history and prophecy. Many characters appear to be modern versions of those from Scripture, identified in the story by more modern contemporary names.

The author does a marvelous job of combining Science Fiction with Biblical history and prophecy, while stirring in a bit of sarcastic humor and irony. The final result is certainly plausible, although not what we are led to expect by traditional interpretations.

Catriona McDonnell's greatest fear is deportation back to Scotland, where she would never see her beloved husband, Dougal, again.

Beth Camp brought me so completely into the story of Catriona and her trek across the continent, that I found myself shivering and

hungry. Her descriptions of the characters' experiences and feelings, of life in the primitive areas of Canada and the northern United States, and the hardships explorers and settlers endured, draw the reader into the story as few writers can. If you enjoy historical fiction, adventure, and a quest driven by love and hope, you will enjoy Rivers of Stone.

In her third McDonnell novel, RIVERS OF STONE, Beth Camp tells the story of a new bride, Catriona, who declines traveling to the Americas' east coast with her family as an indentured servant. Instead, she chooses to sail to the Americas on the Hudson's Bay Co. ship, Prince Rupert, as a hired-on-hand—disguised as Cat, her husband's brother. They dock at Hudson's Bay fort, York in September 1842

When Catriona's husband, Dougal, and his younger brother, Colin, are sent west with a brigade, Catriona/Cat stays behind at York, working as clerk and copier. Losing her advocates and protectors, she constantly looks over her shoulder in fear of someone discovering her deception. Nor only here, but throughout the novel, the reader feels Catriona's deep anxiety about the pretense, about sleeping in the same room with unwashed men and how she endures the severe winter climate in northern Canada.

Catriona/Cat acquires strength and stamina of a young man and picks up the fort's lingo. Yet the reader gets a chance to know her as a woman when she shows her true female feelings in secluded places. When Dougal doesn't return in a year, like he promised, she desperately tries to hide her fear of abandonment. Later, when Dougal's letters stop, Catriona grieves in solitude. Then she buckles- up and joins a brigade going to Vancouver in search of Dougal. The reader is intimately involved with the young woman as she—struggles in her four year search—endures the blizzards, floods and treks over the Canadian Rockies beside rough-tough fur men, buffalo hunters, scoundrels, breeds and friends .

In Scotland, in the first half of the nineteenth century, countless farmers were forced off their land so wealthy landowners could devote the countryside to pasturing sheep. As a result of this forced upheaval, Catriona McDonnell, her husband Dougal, and his brother Colin hire on with the Hudson's Bay Company. Known as Cat, she disguises herself as a boy and pretends to be a third brother.

Once arriving at York Factory on the icy shores of Hudson's Bay, she is soon put to work as a clerk in the trading post. Soon Dougal is sent to Fort Vancouver while she is forced to remain behind. Not only must she cope with her husband being away, she must maintain her identity as a boy, lest she be sent back to Britain. This then is the story of her trials over the next several years. During this time she makes friends, enemies, and nearly gives up hope of ever being reunited with Dougal.

Extremely well written, *Rivers of Stone* excels in authentic detail of the time. The suspense as Cat maintains her masquerade and her longing for Dougal continues at a high level throughout the story. Also notable is her willingness to make friends with, and to be friended by those of other origins, including members of the Cree Nation.

This is an entertaining, informative, and absorbing read. It is Book Three in the story of *The McDonnell Clan*, but it need not be read in sequence with the first two volumes. It is truly a stand-alone work, and its quality should convince readers they need to read the other stories in the series as well.
