





COMMUNICATONS:

On many occasions we assume we and the other guy are on the same page in understanding, and we aren't. Have you ever experienced that? You both say you understand, but in actuality you are on different pages.

It just happened to me in my attempt to set up a book signing and adding two more writers to the event. After meeting with the store manager responsible for book signings, we still hadn't had a meeting of our minds. I didn't realize an email was required. I had already set up a signing of my own and had verbal permission to add writers to the signing. I was wrong. Notification not just verbal, but in writing, via email. I have since worked through that particular event and hope there isn't anything hiding in the shadows.

Communication: having been in the communication end of events both as a manager within a Fortune 100 company, and in the military, I should have made a TO DO LIST. I didn't even think about the SOP (Standard Operating Procedures) of the store. I relied on the store manager helping me to do what she expected of me. I could have avoided a mix-up simply by using my head and asked if there was anything I needed to do to add the writers for an event. Therefore, the big

thing was to use my head. A couple of questions would have eliminated the problem.

Verbal communications can easily lead to confusion. Listen to that little voice that has a question. Remember the KISS formula, "Keep It Simple Stupid!!" Got a question and don't understand, ask. I use, "So What?" and "What If?" a lot. I should have done that here. Think of communications and what it means to you and to the person you are communicating

with.

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It can also apply to your writing: the "So Whats" and the "What Ifs." They will make your writing stronger! Listen more, talk less! Think and ask if you don't fully understand, have a doubt, or have a question or a point of

confusion. I learned something, so my day wasn't wasted.

Spokane Authors met on Friday, February 9th at the Corbin Senior Activity Center. We welcomed new member Kevin

Hostbjor, author of *The Musher Man*. Visitors included: Mrs. Stevenson, D.J. and Denise Guy, authors of the children's' book *From Ragamuffin to Lovestuffin*, Shane Murdoch, Jesed Haugen, & Wilbur Drafs, a friend of Bob Manion.

Our new president, Carl Northup, opened the meeting. First, Bob Manion presented suggestions for book signings. He gave us several great tips, such as: a bookstand for each title you are signing, handing out copies of book reviews to potential buyers, engage with potential buyers by asking them their favorite reads, asking if they have ever thought of writing, and in general identifying with them.

Carl then introduced our speaker, Ben Van Voorhis, writer, editor, journalist, tech writer, and real estate writer. Ben suggested an interactive format, asking if we would each introduce ourselves, say what we're working on and what we would like to improve. mentioned he writes historical fiction and fantasy and noted the difference between plotters and planners. Bob Manion talked about the importance of readability, using words in dialogue that fit the time period and context while not using unfamiliar words the reader must look up. Shane Murdock told us that because of a teacher's encouragement, he became a writer. Jesed Haugen, Sue Eller, Esther Hildahl, and Elena Smith shared a little of their writers' journeys as well. Bob Weldin emphasized how important life experience, and he has a lot, is in writing.

We had our usual raffle, and the meeting was adjourned.

Spokane Authors also met on Saturday February 17th in the social hall at St. Francis of Assisi Church. 

FEATURED BOOK REVIEWS

Master storyteller, Beth Camp's Mothers Don't Die, took me way out of my usual wheelhouse of reading choices. She scared the spit out of me in the first two chapters and throughout the book. The story is fast paced, with plot

twists and turns that kept me turning pages, and thinking, what would I do in a similar situation?

A family goes camping, sets up camp and takes a walk when the father finds something so chilling that he wants to take the whole family with him to report the crime. The little daughter is asleep, and the mother does not want to wake her. The scene is set for disaster.

Beth's characters are vivid, believable, and real. I could NOT put the book down. I read most of the book in one day, then forced myself to wait to finish it the next day. I was breathless through most of it, hating the villain, frustrated with the police, and the husband, and hoping the wife would somehow escape with her child.

If you like reading thrillers, this book is for you! I don't normally choose thrillers, and I could NOT put this down. Check out Beth's other books. The McDonald Series and her art crimes mysteries. Beth writes strong women characters who overcome the challenges they face. Her characters are believable.

and devotion are keys, both to the story told and the production of this book. Growing up without the warmth of family love, Rose Nunez Olivo marries and showers her sixteen children with devotion. She dedicates herself to providing each of them with the love, guidance, and caring she never had. Recognizing the transformation in her mother's life, daughter Barbara (child number thirteen) tells Rose's amazing story to the world.

What emerges as a result of Barbara's dedication is a massively complete work. It begins with the arrival of Rose's immigrant father, Joseph Nunez in the historic mining town of Campo Seco where he meets, falls in love with, and marries Adelaide "Lydia" Madriago. When she tragically dies of tuberculosis at twenty-one, the couple already has three children. Jacqueline Rose is the second born. She has an older brother, Rodger, and a younger sister, Marie.

As a single parent, Joseph "Pa Pa" struggles to keep his young family united while providing for them. Disagreements with one of his late wife's family, and a desperate need to see his children cared for, force him to contact Children's Aid and place them in foster care. Rose and Rodger go to live with Teresa Espinosa, an older lady with a perhaps shady past, whom they know as "Ma." The children are properly, if not generously provided for, and contribute to the household income from an early age, delivering Ma's homemade enchiladas and tamales around their San Jose neighborhood.

After graduating from high school, Rose marries Nello John Olivo, Sr. She blossoms,

enveloping their ever-increasing brood with all the love and care she had been denied in her childhood.

The laminated hard cover volume is well illustrated with family photos, genealogical charts, and excerpts of Rose's philosophies. 16 X MOM: A MASTERY OF MOTHERHOOD is an inspirational celebration of maternal love and well worth reading. 

Another great story by Bob Weldin. Mullins, Sara main character and from Weldin's also first book, is an exploration geologist. She and her soon-to-be husband, Brad, travel into the Idaho wilderness on



horseback, searching for old mines, lost gems, and treasure. Sometimes, they have to use small planes to get in and out of these remote locations. Throw in a South American drug cartel, trying to get even for having their drug stash destroyed, and you have quite an adventure.

Weldin uses his knowledge as a former geologist, adventurer, and mining engineer to create this exciting story. *The Adventurists* should be read by all who like

adventure stories and want to learn more about the dangers of mining.

When exploration geologist Brad O'Connor investigates an old underground mine in the North Cascades on the Washington/Canadian border, he finds more than he bargains for: trouble, serious, international trouble. Later, he meets up with his fiancé, fellow geologist, Sara Mullins, to take an assignment in the Salmon River Mountains of central Idaho. The problem is, trouble follows them.

The Adventurists is rich with mining, gems and mineral information. The story takes place in 1967, before conveniences such as GPS, cell phones or laptops exist. In addition, small plane and helicopter use adds to the story's adventure, as does the use of horses to get to dense wilderness areas. When all else fails, Sara's rock-climbing experience comes into play for those hard-to-access mineral deposits.

Author Bob Weldin, a former mining engineer for the US Bureau of Mines, writes from experience about the logistics of mining. His creative mind fills in the rest. *The Adventurists*, Weldin's second novel, is a sequel to *The Dry Diggin's Club*.

An outdoor adventure mystery 4.0 out of 5 stars

In *The Adventurists*, Bob Weldin draws from his own life's experience to create a griping story of wilderness adventure that takes the reader into the wilds of Idaho to confront dangers presented not only by nature, but also by men with evil intent. In Sara Mullins, Weldin creates a character as alluring as she is tough and capable. Sara is a geologist, trained and experienced at wilderness work, but on this assignment, she and her partner, Brad, are stalked by a murderous assassin in a complex

web of intrigue and danger involving airplanes, underground mines, drugs, guns and mysterious people.

Exploring wilderness areas searching for profitable mineral deposits and evaluating old mines for renewed production is risky enough without contending with a South American drug cartel.

Investigating an old mine near the U. S.-Canadian border, Brad O'Conner and his partner discover it is being used to hide large supplies of drugs. Barely escaping the smugglers, they vow to never talk about what they have seen. When the old mine mysteriously blows up shortly thereafter, Brad realizes that he, his partner, and most importantly, Sara Mullins, his love interest and fellow geologist are in danger. Provided FBI protection, Brad and Sara begin exploration of mineral deposits and mining claims in a large wilderness area in Idaho. They are aided by friends living in the local area, family members with the controlling interest in a fly-in only recreation ranch, and members of associated government agencies. All the while they are forced to keep an eye out for members of the cartel who are seeking revenge for the destruction of their drug supply.

Besides being an exciting and fast-paced thriller, *The Adventurists* contains large doses of outdoor adventure, a proportional serving of romance, and a bit of geological and mining education. Taking place in the 1960s, it seems odd to us that the characters are in the wilds without cellphones or internet capability. They have to find an established phone or two-way radio in order to contact anyone.

The story is well written and proves difficult to put down. As the sequel to *The Dry Diggin's Club*, it completes a story the author originally began in hopes of detailing his career and experiences as an exploration geologist and mining engineer.
