Spokane Authors met Friday October 13<sup>th</sup> at the Corbin Senior Activity Center. Present were Larry Danek, Mary De Bord, Betty Deuber, Sue Eller, Dennis Held, Esther Hildahl, Bob Hildahl, Marilee Hudon, Connie Kerbs (new member), Bob Manion, Dave McChesney, Carl Northrup, Kate Poitevin, Elena Smith, Linda Sonntag-Noble, and Darlene Stevens (new member). Present as guests were Shane Murdock-Stephan and Theresa Topp.

Since our speaker had not yet arrived, we began with the business portion of our meeting. Sue told us about the efforts of Eric Schubach and others to celebrate National Indie Book Day at Aunties on April 27, 2024. Elena Smith, Mary De Bord, and Esther Hildahl indicated they would be interested in selling and signing books at the event. They are also hoping to have people do readings, and as well present some writers workshops. (Sue Eller, Marilee Hudon, and Dave McChesney are representing Spokane Authors as this event is planned and are scheduled to meet with the rest of the writers organizations on Tuesday October 24<sup>th</sup>.)

The next big topic was elections. We'll be selecting officers and advisory board members at our November 10 meeting. All offices are open for nomination and possible new office holders. As both our President and Vice President have indicated they will step down, we will need new people in those positions. Carl Northrup indicated he would serve as President if elected. Thus, we will need someone to serve as Vice President. Those currently in the remaining positions will be considered to be running for reelection to those they spots unless notifv Dave McChesney (who will be putting the ballot together) that they do not wish to continue in office. Dave McChesney indicated he will stay on as Treasurer, and Esther Hildahl said she would be willing to remain as one of the Advisory Board members. Mary De Bord and Connie Kerbs mentioned they would be interested in Advisory Board positions.

Dave McChesney noted that he would try to have a ballot put together in time to be sent out to members along with the November newsletter, on or about the first of the month. Members can vote and return the ballot via email, USPS, bring them to the November meeting, or pick up and mark a ballot at the meeting. (Common sense says that only those members whose dues are up to date are eligible to vote, and anyone elected to office should also be up to date regarding dues.)

As we approach the Holiday Shopping Season, the number of arts and craft fairs is going up. Members are planning to attend various events over the next few months, including Mt. Spokane, Central Valley, Mead, Shadle, and Ridgeline High Schools, to name a few.

By now, our speaker had arrived. Sue quickly introduced Patricia Meredith who gave a wonderful and fast-paced presentation. She writes historical/cozy fiction novels, with many of her stories set here in Spokane. Many of the places mentioned in her stories are places one can visit today. Other stories are set at the North Pole, and some inspired by Anna Katherine Green, who in turn inspired Sir Author Conan Doyle. Patricia spoke about her writing, editing, (self) publishing, and marketing process. She noted that when she is reviewing her work, she goes by what she called the "ABCD" method. Is it AMAZING? Hopefully it is not BORING! Ideally it is not CONFUSING! Is there anything one DIDN'T BELIEVE?

She was accompanied by her husband Andrew Meredith who writes epic fantasy. Following her presentation, she took time to talk with many of our members, as well as to sell and sign copies of her books.

As usual, the last part of our meeting was our drawing for door prizes. In a strange twist of fate, Bob Manion ended up winning a copy of one of his own books. Sue declared the meeting adjourned, and we all went our separate ways. Our next meeting is set for Friday November 10<sup>th</sup>, and as mentioned previously will include officer and board member elections. At this point it is unclear if we will have a speaker or not. If so, word will be sent as soon as it is known. Our December meeting will be an open mic session to allow our members (and guests) to share a little of their work with us.

## FEATURED BOOK REVIEWS

This month we will continue with our usual order.

Sara Bennett is a Smokejumper, earning her living by parachuting out of airplanes to fight forest fires. On a training and qualification jump she is injured. While recovering she meets a young doctor that she feels may be the man in her life. At the same time she is forced out of the Smokejumpers and becomes a Ranger with the Federal Fish and Wildlife Law Enforcement Service. Here she meets fellow Ranger Randy Springer. They soon become a team in a number of ways.

On the job, their pursuit of lawbreakers goes way beyond tracking down the occasional poacher or the fisherman with an expired license. Escaped prisoners, illicit drugs, terrorists, and corruption at the high levels of government make life interesting for Sara and Randy.

This was an interesting and entertaining story, one that was difficult to put down. It nicely combines action, romance, great characters, with an appreciation of both the wild lands of America with deep respect for those in the Armed Forces and Law Enforcement. It is a fitting sequel to Manion's earlier *Springer's Heart*.

Private investigator Emily Trace is called upon to determine why the classic car runs great, except at a certain spot along the road. Delving into that situation also reveals problems with the internet and strange lights in the sky. As Christmas time approaches, and as the coldest snowiest winter in years engulfs the town, she tackles these mysteries while also investigating the deaths of her late husband, his grandfather, and most recently, an arson fire. She is aided by a deputy sheriff, her office staff, a former teacher, and friends who are not from this world. Is there an extraterrestrial plot to conquer Earth? Will she discover and stop it in time?

Sue Eller writes in an easy conversational manner. The story is in first person; as if the reader is listening to Emily relate her tale while sitting at the kitchen table drinking cup after cup of coffee. Even the little asides, which writers today are admonished to avoid, fit right in with the casual tone and add, rather than detract from the narration. While the story is for the most part light and perhaps even cozy in nature, it also touches on some deeper darker aspects of human nature.

This blend of Science Fiction and Mystery is enjoyable, easy to read, and hard to put down. *Taming of the T-Bird* is available online in both e-book and paperback versions, and in bookstores near the author's home of Spokane, Washington.

This is the second book of the *Emily Trace Mystery* series. It's about Emily Trace who has a detective agency in Spokane, Washington called "E.T. Investigations." She drinks coffee to excess, which I can clearly identify with, and she has an amusing "bird" clock in her office that sings out different bird songs on the hour. It's wintertime, snowy and freezing cold.

The story begins with her first client telling her a strange tale. He purchased a used T-Bird, but every time he drives it home from work, it quits on him at the exact same spot. At the same time, bright lights swoop over him and seem to be headed for Tekoa Mountain. Then the car starts right up again! Can Emily solve this mystery?

While she is working on the T-Bird mystery and the possibility that aliens are trying to take over our planet, her mother-inlaw's house burns to the ground. And the fire marshal suspects arson. Could this be related to her husband, Jared's unsolved murder? After all, this was the reason she started her detective agency to begin with.

If you like science fiction and mysteries, you must read this book. It is well written with great characters. The story is exciting and it's a hard book to put down from the first chapter to the end.
