Monthly meetings inspiration and education provide by knowledgeable and entertaining guest speakers, and the cheerful camaraderie of people sharing common interests and goals. Membership is open to all who love writing, art, and interesting people.

OUR JULY 2024 MEETINGS

Friday July 12 at 2:00 pm found Spokane Authors meeting for the second time at the Sans Souci West Club House at the far end of West Boon Avenue. In attendance were Caryl Briscoe-Michas, Larry Danek, Jennifer Day, Mary De Bord, Sheri Decker, Sue Eller, Denise Guy, D. J. Guy, T. Hammond, Amy Logan, Bob Manion, Dave McChesney, Carl Northrup, Kate Poitevin, Elena Smith, and Terry Stratton. Visiting was Shandra Tanner, an illustrator.

Dave McChesney announced he'd received signup information for the Craft Fair at Ridgeline High School to be held in December and would sign up for a booth if a couple of other members were willing to go along with him. He also mentioned trying to get a booth and sell books during Palouse Days on September 14th. Again, he said we would sign up if others wanted to take part. (Two or three individuals indicated interest in each activity.)

Carl Northrup noted a vendor event north of Priest River on the 28th and 29th of September. He also talked a little about some fairly obscure but potentially ominous government regulations regarding businesses organized as LLCs.

Carl also shared a rather detailed list of thoughts regarding the compilation of a Spokane Authors catalog that had originally been prepared by Dave McChesney. It had originally been shared with those members who had said they would work on the catalog project

Larry passed around examples of some query letters he had written in the past. He talked a little of where to find listings for literary agents and reminded us to be on the lookout for "rip-off" companies. Bob Manion added to the discussion by mentioning a number of publications listing agents and publishers.

Sue Eller warned us to watch for companies that imply a connection to Amazon, while in reality they have none. T. Hammond noted a site known as "Query Shark" that could

be of help for anyone looking for an agent.

Carl said his kid's book, *Princess who had no Name* was in the final stages of preparation. Shandra Tanner was doing the illustrations for it. He also talked a little about bulk pricing for having bookmarks printed up, and stated they often work better than business cards, especially when dealing with younger readers.

Finally, Terry Stratton read from his story based on the writing prompts he had drawn a few meetings earlier. As his story was longer than originally intended, he will finish it at our next meeting.

As the meeting wound down, we held our door prize drawing, Carl declared the meeting adjourned and we went our separate ways.

Spokane Authors also met at 2:00 pm. On Saturday July 20th in the social hall of St. Francis of Assisi Church. Attending were Larry Danek, Denise Guy, D. J. Guy, Kevin Hostbjor, Bob Manion, Dave McChesney, Carl Northrup, and Terry Stratton.

Dave McChesney talked about the catalog and showed some examples of how he thought it should be laid out and formatted. He had set it up with two columns per page, with each column having three items, either an author bio, or a book listing. General opinion was that this made the page a little busy and hard to read, so it was suggested to go to a single column of three items per page. Dave noted that in most cases, author bios and book descriptions were too long for the space available, so asked that individual members work on cutting these items down to a workable length. He suggested that we all have these done no later than the end of August, or with a grace period, by the time we meet at Saint Francis of Assisi in September. (September 21st.) That should allow time to get the catalog put together and printed, prior to the Holiday shopping season and the various arts and craft fairs.

Dave said he would send the information and request to the rest of the Spokane Authors membership. He also noted that if one wanted to be included in the catalog,

they would need to be current in their dues... paid up for 2024, by the deadline noted above. It was also agreed that book entries in the catalog should include ISBNs and utilize a coding system that would indicate where and how the books are available. We also talked about including the prices of the books in the catalog.

A month or so earlier, President Carl Northrup had suggested we put together and publish another anthology. Vice-President Bob Manion suggested it should be a Christmas themed book, noting that such items tend to sell quite well, even during the non-Holiday season. He also suggested that we each write and bring a Christmas/Holiday themed story to our next (August) meeting at St. Francis.

By then, our allotted time was nearly up, so we packed up and headed home.



FEATURED BOOK REVIEWS

This month we resume our regular rotation through the reviews we have on file.

James Parry spent the majority of his career in education teaching middle school students in Spokane, Washington. The fact that he survived and was able to write about his experiences is testament to his fortitude. From the obviously manufactured page of "blurbs" concerning the book, ie., "Steinbeck, Hemingway, Faulkner, and, now, Parry. remarkable book: dazzling. James Parry is a treasure. (Signed) James Parry, Author," and, "This book better sell after all the time you've spent on it. (Signed) Lynda Parry, Author's Wife," one is immersed in the hilarity and hijinks that is middle school. Even the title, Book All the Teachers was inspired by a true incident. Mr. Parry arrived at school one morning to find that someone had spray painted, "(Expletive Deleted) All the Teacher

Excep Parry" on the wall. As it would be sometime before a pressure washer could be obtained to remove the offending language, the custodian used his own spray paint to change the obscenity to "book."

While Book All the Teachers is an over the top hilarious look at Middle School, it is also the story of one man's dedication to making a difference in the lives of his students. That dedication never faltered during the entire span of James Parry's teaching career. A must read for those who taught, attended, or want to know the truth about middle school life.

Book All The Teachers! is a true, educational, often humorous story that depicts the ups and downs of all those involved in a certain middle school in Spokane, Washington. It's told by the author whose teaching career spanned 35 years, including five spent tutoring kids that had been suspended or expelled from school.

As a former teacher, I really enjoyed reading this book; wondering about the title and having it humorously explained in chapter one; reading the creative front pages "Here's what they're saying about *Book All The Teachers!*" written by the author, his friends??, and his wife--very funny stuff; and the "Warning" page--again, very funny.

Parry is a gifted writer who knows how to bring his characters and settings to life. This story is well constructed, fast paced, and a real page turner.

Everybody who cares or has ever had an opinion on our school system or its teachers must read *Book All The Teachers!* to truly understand what it's really like to be on the "ground" level of teaching in a middle school.

Parry gives the reader an insider's look at life as a middle school teacher, and it's not what you might expect. Any teacher who can spend 30 years trying to implant information in the brains of children who have the mistaken idea they are adults and already know it all, deserves a medal or a complimentary stay at Eastern State Mental Hospital, or both. Parry got neither, but he did get to know that he impacted the lives of at least a few of his students in a positive way. I think I would have liked to have had Parry as a teacher. Who knows? I might have even developed an interest in history. Excellent autobiography.

The Delivery of Flesh is the first book of the Bulletproof Witch series. This is a fantasy western that tells the story of Temperance Whiteoak, the granddaughter of the late famous pistol warlock Brimstone. She travels the continent of Korvana on her horse, Astor, who is able to talk to her by conveying his thoughts to her mind, searching for clues behind her family's murder. Along the way, she captures daemons who spread death and terror everywhere they go. She is a witch and a gunslinger who has magical bullets called hexbullets.

One day, she rode into the small town of Rosea, intent on collecting the bounty for the daemon called Belial she had just captured in a silver tube. However, before she leaves, she is talked into helping Marshal Peter Scrimshaw of the Federated Territories transport a prisoner to the town of Benson for trial. The prisoner's name is Obadiah Lalaish, and he is a dangerous sorcerer. Thus, the adventure begins, including the escape of Belial.

I enjoyed reading this book and will begin the second book in the series soon. Blair has written a very creative story with lots of interesting characters. The story is never boring and I recommend it to one and all.


In this book Temperance continues her search for the powerful daemon Belial who destroyed her hometown and everyone she loved, including her mother, father, and grandfather, James Whiteoak, inventor of the powerful hexbullet and first of the Pistol Warlocks, the greatest sorcerer of all.

However, Belial set a trap for her, causing her to fall into a pit. Her only hope for rescue was her talking horse, Astor, but she wasn't sure he knew where she was. After three days, she was finally rescued by an old weather-beaten looking man by the name of Sven Jacoben, but her horse was nowhere to be found. Following Sven, she ends up in the little mountain town of Shady Hollow. Here she discovers that the residents have their own problems with daemons, missing young men, and she becomes friends with a young girl named Ruth.

There's a lot of adventure in this story and a surprise involving "sweet innocent" Ruth. Blair is a creative writer. Here are two examples: "Fear. That particular emotion had been absent for so long, even the sound of it felt strange in Belial's head: dry and musty as ancient spiderwebs found in a sealed room." And "It was a beautiful day, for all that it was cold. The sky was an endless blue canvas stretching away towards the horizon, the sun

overhead serving as the centerpiece. Every plant in the forest tilted skyward, trying to grasp what last bit of warmth they could before winter came upon them."

I enjoyed reading this book and I recommend it to one and all.


