





Spokane Authors met at the Sans Souci West Club House, on Friday November 14 at 2:00 pm. Attending were Caryl Briscoe-Michas, Joel Craig, Larry Danek, Mary DeBord, Betty Deuber, Gary Edwards, Sue Eller, Mark Lee Golden, Denise Guy, D. J. Guy, Esther Haldahl, Bob Hildahl, Kevin Hostbjor, Joan Kopczysnki, Stephen Lalonde, Amy Logan, Bob Manion, Dave McChesney, Carl Northrup, Elena Smith, Linda Sonntag, Terry Stratton, and Sarah Vail. Guests included Kat Collins, Dennis Thomas, and Genny La Morgan.

Bob Manion talked a little about setting up a book signing, book sales event at the local VA Hospital. Steve Lalonde introduced a short pamphlet sized "chapter book" he'd compiled, called *Ecstasy Through Agony: The Writer's Odyssey*. He had several copies of it available for those that might want a copy.

Dave McChesney was our featured speaker for the day. He talked about character names and used examples from the *Stone Island Sea Stories* to illustrate the points he tried to make. He suggested that naming a character made them more important in the story and allowed the reader to better identify

that character as a unique individual. He also mentioned the importance of names fitting the time and place of the story, along with matching nationality, ethnicity, and so on.

Following a break, Elena Smith talked about Spokane Authors doing an educational presentation at the Museum of Arts and Culture, probably sometime in the spring. There are a number of rules we would have to comply with, and we need to let the Museum know our intentions by the end of this year. Sue Eller told us of fellow member Gail Saunders' new children's book. Amy Logan mentioned a new book/magazine for or about veterans. *Military Experience In The Arts*. A number of upcoming craft fairs were also noted, with Shadle Park High School and Mead High School both being the weekend beginning the next day. Coming up in the early part of December are craft fairs at Ridgeline High School and Stratton Elementary School in Newport, Washington.

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

Mentu the Nubian





Mentu the Nubian is a continuation of Sinon of Kira, in which Mentu-formerly Sinon's enslaved servant—is granted his freedom after saving Sinon's life. In this seguel, the narrative shifts to Mentu's perspective, tracing the complex personal and cultural challenges he faces as a newly freed man seeking to construct his true identity. His pursuit of self-understanding centers on a return to his origins, prompting a voyage to rediscover the place of his birth and. find the potentially, to mother he was separated from in childhood.

Now captain of his own the Cyrene, Mentu navigates a series of adversities with determination, each obstacle reinforcing his self-determination in the aftermath of enslavement. The culminates in a moving reunion between Sinon and Mentu, marked by their first embrace—a symbolic gesture of their liberation from the racial prejudices that once defined their relationship. Whether Mentu succeeds in finding his mother remains an open question left for the reader to discover.

Lalonde's prose is fluid and engaging, skillfully integrating action, emotions and cultural context. *Mentu the Nubian* offers a compelling continuation of the series, and it sets the stage effectively for the next volume. *Anissi*



By Hap Murphy (An autobiography)

Henry "Hap" Murphy was a storyteller with a remarkable memory for names and details. Except for a few years in the Army during WWII, and a short time at Lake Roosevelt, Hap spent his active life on and around the lakes and rivers of Northern Idaho. He was born in Coeur d' Alene (CDA) and spent his early youth on the banks of the Pend Oreille River at Dover, at that time a bustling sawmill town. His father worked for the Dover Lumber Company and was in charge of the tugboats that towed the logs to the mill. Hap occasionally went with his father on a two or three day trip up Pend Oreille Lake for a tow of logs for the mill. He tells several stories of his mischievous boyhood in and around Dover.

Hap became a tugboat captain and spent most of his adult life on or near Lake CDA living a full and rich life around family and friends. He worked hard and sometime played hard. He tells stories of Harrison and St. Maries when they were bustling, rowdy towns with bar fights and brothels. He tells stories


about making and selling home brew and moonshine during Prohibition. He tells of the 1933 flood and how tough it was for some people during the great depression.

He learned to cook on the tugboats or while batching in his boat house, tied up at the CDA beach. Army cooks were famous for being sloppy and bad. Hap was so good at KP duty that he rose to chief cook and was the pride of his unit. He later opened the Boat Drive Inn Cafe in CDA for more than a decade.

My First 90 Years is a good read, and of special interest to those who grew up in the CDA area. Or maybe you just want to remember the men who piloted the tugs and walked the tow lines, to get the logs down the river and across the lake to the sawmills.



My Name Is Tamar tells the story of a young Canaanite girl, whose character is taken from the Bible, Chapter 38 in the Book of The author tells her story as he imagined it might be. When she is fourteen, she is married to the eldest son of a Hebrew man named Judah. Judah has high hopes that she will produce heirs, especially sons, but instead she experiences rape and much abuse. After her husband dies unexpectedly, she marries Judah's second son who is also cruel and he, too, dies. Judah does not offer his third son because he is afraid that he might die, too. Meanwhile, Tamar is desperate to be married and have children. In disguise, acting as a prostitute, she decides to seduce her widowed father-in-law, who she feels is a good and decent man. This was a very dangerous thing to do, for she could be put to death.

This is a well-written book with well-defined characters. It's a page turner and a good read. I've always enjoyed reading stories taken from the Bible and Jessett did a good job describing what life was probably like back in Biblical times and how poorly and unfairly women were often treated.





Jan Vasquez, a specialist in animal behavior, finds herself face to face with a



Kari Barr's novel, Once Again: Tales of Destiny is for anyone who believes in magic, as well as those, who do not. The plot takes many turns as it winds through the lives of humans, *Fair Ones*, and ogres, mixing the worlds of fantasy and realism. The point of view changes in this novel from character to character. The many characters featured in this novel originate in *Faire Realms* (fairy kingdoms). Kari refers to them as *Fair Ones*.

MARA, the main female protagonist, is first introduced as a human. She's a college student studying photography in Seattle, Washington, who has felt different from her classmates since she was a small child. She does and sees weird things no one else experiences. After attempting to tell others about them, she is rebuffed, and learns to keep quiet about her whimsical encounters.

AERRVIN AP ROSEWIN, the main male protagonist, is a *Fairy Prince*. His mother is about to give up her throne, then his sister will be Queen, so he is asked to go to America and create his own kingdom. He's reluctant, until the Wind Sprite, Mirri Sihee, his constant companion and he, all six inches of him, rest on a star fish beached by the tide pool. There she advises him. "My Lord, I do agree 'tis time for you to put aside your childhood... Go make a legend of your search, worthy of the bards of

olden time." At 124 years old, he thinks, — yes, it is time enough I make my own realm. After making his decision known, other Fair Ones tell Aerrvin, he needs a wife to do that. Paying no heed to the advice, he transposes to America, as a human, and unmarried. He settles in Seattle, Washington, and buys an old laundromat.

MORVAYNE AP STEWART, the villain is an evil elf. Since elves good or bad rank higher in the domain than all the Wee people, he can do anything he wants. For centuries and centuries, he has been bound and determined to marry Mara.

In this novel, unbeknownst to mortals, many *Fair Ones*— good elves, goblins, brownies and sprites, as well as evil elves, ogres, and trolls, inhabit the human world.

At twenty, Mara studies photography at the university. On weekday mornings, she waits at the bus-stop at the corner, near the Victorian home she inherited, for the ride to the university. One day, in 2009, she notices the old laundromat across the street is getting a new face; unfamiliar young people are renovating it. It's starting to look like a quaint gift and antique shop, and she thinks it will spice up the neighborhood. A slight wind ruffles the long blonde hair of one of the young male workers. A glow encircles him and she names him Mr. Sunshine, a golden boy. A split second before she boards the bus her stare meets his, and a strange force sweeps through her body.

That morning, while working on the building, Aerrvin rests a moment, wipes his brow, and looks across the street. He sees a girl, a girl with an aura about her, when suddenly the bus pulls up. For a second, before she boards it, the *Fairy Prince* feels the girl's emotions brush against his soul, and he's able to flash his "Purple and Gold Brilliance." He stands in awe. *Did she feel It? Would he see her again?*

Later in the day, Aerrvin and his workers meet other humans. Jill, a human, a baker and Mara's roommate, immediately plans a block party for the new neighbors. Still, in 2009, Morvayne lurks and waits for his chance to marry Mara.

Only some characters in Kari's story have the power or magic to change from Fair Ones to humans and back again. When Mara discovers she has that power, she accepts she is one of few who inherits the genes of magic. Suddenly, she understands why she feels fulfilled in the morning, after wakening from the dreams she has had of dancing in the magic kingdom with fairies, brownies, sprites, and all Fair Ones, and why those night fantasies were not dreams at all. Mara unknowingly penetrated the void into the land of fairies and had actually danced all night. Whilst falling in love with Golden Boy in both spheres, Mara seems to have little concern with destiny. The evil elf, Morvayne, seems to dwell on it.

Throughout the book, Kari's prose often sounds like poetry. She understands the Weepeople's life style so well; she makes the unbelievable, believable. Who knows, she may be a *Fair One*.

Once Again: Tales of Destiny deserves five jingles from Tinker Bell.
