




OUR APRIL 2025 MEETINGS

We welcomed new member Joel Craig and guests Lindsey Anderson, G. S. Jennsen, and Katie Hauritz.

President Carl Northrup introduced Vice-President Sue Eller, who in turn introduced our guest speaker, Frank Scalise, former member of the Spokane Police Department and author who writes as Frank Zafiro. His topic was audio books.

Frank began by talking a little about publishing in general and noted that in this day and age one can do everything that a publisher can do, or we can hire out to have it done. He noted that some feel it legitimizes our work to have it traditionally published, and there are still some who look down on the independent, self-published author. If one has a book out in print, as an e-book, or as an audio book, it does tend to validate it.

There are several ways to produce an audio book. One way is to go through Books In Motion, located here in the Spokane area. They are a traditional publisher, except that they produce audio books rather than print books. There is no cost to the author to have a book recorded, but the audio publisher has full control, and it may end up that the author receives smaller royalties.

Indie Authors can also work through Amazon, or ACX, Audio Gate, Find Away Voices (owned by Spotify) and Chirp (owned by Book Bub). One can hire a narrator/voice actor to record one's book or do it oneself. Paying the voice actor can be a matter of royalty sharing, a fixed fee based on the running time of the recording, or a combination of both. If an author decides to record the book, he should have a quiet room with no echoes, a good podcast quality microphone, and an audio editing system such as Audacity. There are several videos on You Tube to point one in the right direction. One would record or have the book read and recorded and then

upload, just as one does with an e-book or a print book for Kindle and other places.

Frank also mentioned that one would have to do some work for the cover, even if it is basically the same as the print version. That's because the cover for an audio book is square, while a print book is rectangular. At the end of his presentation, he shared a few samples of audio recordings of some of his books.

Once Frank had ended his presentation, we took a break and then came back to finish up our meeting. Elena Smith noted that her new website was completed and available at www.elenasmithbooks.com Carl Northrup announced he'd finished his WIP, and it had been sent out to Beta readers. He's hoping to have it published by the end of May. Finally, we drew for door prizes, said "goodbye" to one another and headed our separate ways.

(If I do not give you credit for being there, I apologize. It's possible I missed a few. We had a good crowd, and Carl noted that it was more than we had had in a long time.)

Spokane Authors also met on Saturday April 19, at vice-president Sue Eller's home. Because we had changed the location, and because it was over Easter weekend, only a few people attended. Present were Caryl Briscoe-Michas, Larry Danek, Sue Eller, and Dave McChesney

Sue had some handouts for everyone, and we took a little time to go over them. One was an intensive list of sound-alike words, such as *to*, *too*, and *too*. Another was a list of sentences and phrases in which we were asked to find the errors. We also discussed the possibility of finding another location for our Saturday meetings, so we don't end up with the doors being locked as happened last month.

Elena S. Smith



Elena's book, *Truths and Lies* surprised me, not only because it's well written but also

because English is not Elena's first language, Russian is. Her PhD in Linguistics is evident as most of the dialogue sounded authentic, as if it were written by an American. It also surprised me because Elena's book covers universal themes of love relationships, whether they are in the U.S., Europe or Russia. For example, she writes: "Men want sex no matter when, with whom, and how, while women as a rule want sex with the man they are in love with." While reading her book, I felt privy to gossip about people I knew or had known in real life. Especially about the lies we tell each other.

Vicki, the protagonist, is a university professor who seeks truth in relationships, not lies or manipulation. She is very independent and has a trust problem with men. I sympathized more with and was hooked by her character Tom, a lonely man in his late 50s, who got served divorce papers when he felt nothing was wrong with his marriage and then gained weight and lost all confidence in himself. I liked that Elena's characters were realistic and flawed. Vicki and Tom meet at a Seattle Seahawks football game, and their entwined lives are forever changed.

The book has several twists and turns, and the political ending surprised me. I found Elena's courage to write about the lies Putin told about Ukraine was nothing less than admirable. This book is so much more than a simple romance story; it is a lesson in the fine art of relationships and the length some people will go to seek the truth. I highly recommend reading it.


