

So far at least, I seem to be on a more normal schedule for sending out this issue of the newsletter. Ideally, it'll go out tomorrow, the last day of the previous month, or at the latest, Monday the 2nd of September. Even

that is well within the time frame I try to meet.



It's getting busy. We have Arts and Craft fairs coming up that a lot of us will participate in as we try to sell some books. We are also trying to put a catalog together to better promote our members'

books. We are also pushing ahead with the idea of a Christmas themed anthology that hopefully will be ready for the public in time for the Christmas shopping season.

If you want to have your books listed in the catalog, you need to be a paid member for 2024. We've also asked that you review your book blurbs/descriptions and make sure they are short enough to fit within the catalog format. (A good target would be between 50 and 70 words.) The same goes for author bios, as we hope to include a short bio and picture of each of the authors listed in the catalog. We've asked that you provide blurbs,

bios, and dues no later than the 21 of September. If bios and blurbs aren't received, catalog "staff" will edit as needed to fit the page. If dues for 2024 aren't received by that date, no books for that member will be listed.

As mentioned, we are also working on a Christmas themed anthology. Our vicepresident talks a little about it in his column. We are basically looking for short stories ranging in length from 1500 to 3000 words or so. (I don't think we'd reject something at 1375 words, or something at 3035, but...) mentions a final submission date of October 11, but it has been suggested we should set an earlier deadline, perhaps around the middle of September, or to coincide with the catalog cut off date. If one wants to write a Christmas based short story, they should be able to do so in that time frame, and we will need time to edit and format before publishing.

So, in reference to our vice-president's column, let's find that magical writer's toddy, take a sip, and get those keyboards clicking.

OUR AUGUST 2024 MEETINGS

Spokane Authors met on Friday, August 9th at the Sans Souci West Club House. Members present included Caryl Briscoe-Michas, Larry Danek, Mary De Bord, Carolyn Eller, Sue Eller, Denise Guy, D. J. Guy, T. Hammond, Esther Hildahl, Bob Hildahl, Suzanne Holland, Kevin Hostbjor, Marilee Hudon, Steve Lalonde, Amy Logan, Bob Manion, Dave McChesney, Jon R. Miller, Carl Northrup, Elena Smith, Mikel and Kay Stevenson, Terry Stratton, and Sarah Vail. Shandra Tanner attended as a guest, joined our organization and is now a member of Spokane Authors.

We began the meeting with several announcements. President Carl Northup noted his children's book The Princess Who Had No Name was close to being ready to publish. He also told us about a Garlic Festival on September 28 and 29 near where he lives and mentioned it might be a good place to have a booth and sell some books. It was noted that members who want to have their books listed in the upcoming catalog should try to pare down book descriptions and author bios to a length that would fit. A soft deadline of the end of August was set, with a final, or "drop dead" deadline of September 21. (Our September meeting at St. Francis.) WE talked a little about creating two anthologies. One would have Christmas and Holiday related stories and poems, while the second would be of a more general nature. The original idea was to have both ready for sale during the Holiday Season, but Sue Eller suggested that may not allow us enough time to ensure quality products. Dave McChesney suggested we keep going, push forward and see what happens.

We also talked a little about Valley Fest in Liberty Lake as a place where one could have a booth. We were also told that our hosts, San Souci West would be having a Craft Fair sometime in November. Sue Eller and T. Hammond should have information on that event. Dave McChesney noted he was still

waiting for the website to be updated so he could sign up for a vendor booth at Palouse Days on September 14th.

Carl then introduced our speaker, Colin He talked primarily about author Conway. branding, and mentioned products so popular they give their name to the product. Nearly all of us refer to facial tissue as Kleenex, as an example. He suggested that those who write in different genres might want to use different pen names. If a reader expects a particular type of story from a particular writer, it might confuse them to find another type of story from that same author. He also noted that we should attempt to deliver what the reader expects, based on the genre we write, and noted that genre can often be defined by the tropes contained in it. These are the standard events and occurrences people expect when reading that type of story.

Colin strongly suggested that an author should have a website, a blog, and a newsletter. He observed that a blog and a newsletter might contain much the same thing, but a blog goes out to everyone, while a newsletter only goes to those who sign up for it. He added that one should try to avoid negativity, politics, and religion.

Following Colin's presentation, we took a short break. We resumed to draw tickets for door prizes before adjourning and going our separate ways.

Spokane Authors also met on Saturday August 17th, at St. Francis of Assisi. Present were Denise Guy, D. J. Guy, Kevin Hostbjor, Marilee Hudon, Bob Manion, Dave McChesney, Pat Moreno, and Terry Stratton. One time member Jeremiah Sargent attended as well and is in the process of rejoining.

As our president was not there, Vice-President Bob Manion conducted the meeting. He noted that the south hill County Library has a system that might allow us to have our books on their shelves. It's based on having reviews or recommendations of the books that would then go in a special local author section. Bob passed out copies of the review form. (Your editor/webmaster can provide copies of the form, should you wish.)

We talked more about the anthologies we are planning to publish. It was agreed there may not be enough time to do both the general and a Christmas themed one in time for the Holiday shopping season, so we agreed that a general one could wait until next year. We will still try and have the Christmas one out for this year. It was suggested that stories range from 1500 to no more than 3000 words. Poems can be of any length. Someone suggested a review committee to look over submissions and Jeremiah offered participate in that. The goal would be to have twenty-four stories in the anthology. October 11 would be the deadline for submission. (It has since been suggested that that be moved up to the middle of September to allow more time for editing, formatting, and other tasks needed before publishing. It would be great to have it out and available by Black Friday.

We also looked at the possibility of having illustrations done for each story, providing we can find someone willing to do so for a reasonable price. Denise and D. J. Guy said they would ask Shandra Tanner, who is now also a member. The question of distributing proceeds was brought up but not discussed in depth. It was suggested that we could donate a percentage of the income to one or more selected charities.

The catalog was also discussed. One question that was raised concerned financing the printing of the catalog. Would those whose books will be in the catalog be willing to contribute a little extra to see it printed, or should costs come out of dues already paid?

Bob talked a little about a publishing company he has been working with. Someone pointed out that the Central Valley High School Arts and Craft Fair is set for Saturday and Sunday, November 2 and 3. Finally we did a short writing exercise, prompted by a picture of two ugly fish Marilee had on her phone.

By then, we were out of topics and out of time, so we locked up and left.



FEATURED BOOK REVIEWS

This month we have a new review for one of our member's books and then we'll resume our normal rotation.

While this is the fifth book in Larry Danek's series about the Nomadic Ghost, it is also a tale of the beginning. In this slim volume of sixty-nine pages, we journey back to the American West and join a wagon train heading to Oregon. Thirteen-year-old John Vanderwick travels alone and appears likely to not survive the journey. With help from the Nomadic Ghost he continues on, aids others in the wagon train. Meanwhile the Ghost begins to understand his role in the afterlife and accomplishes a mission he has been chosen for.

The story is meticulously told as if by the ghost himself and is a quick yet compelling read. It is available on Amazon.

Pioneer Ghost begins when The Nomadic Ghost enters the body of John Vanderwick, a small, sickly thirteen-year-old boy, who has died after being left behind by a wagon train heading for Oregon. The ghost is not sure what his mission is and finds the body very weak and needing rest. However, they eventually catch up to the wagon train that had abandoned John. After eating and getting some rest, they decide to leave the train because the body is still too weak. Before leaving, the ghost/John is able to get a gun from one of the trail hands named Tom Brown. John already had a knife and a small bag with a flint in it.

As they rested and waited for a later wagon train, they killed six Indians and rescued an Indian woman named Ina and a little blondhaired girl around five years old named Patty. When more Indians attacked, Ina proved to be a very good shot. Afterwards, they ended up with twelve horses that had belonged to the dead Indians. Then they helped the wagon train they left, defend itself against an Indian attack, joining it, after a deal is made concerning the horses. Many things happen as the story progresses. When they reach Fort Henry, The Nomadic Ghost discovers the real reason for this adventure.

Once again, Larry Danek has written an exciting story with believable characters. It's well written and the story moves right along. I recommend this book to one and all, especially those that like ghost stories and/or pioneer stories.

Pioneer Ghost begins as a young boy is abandoned by a wagon train boss who figured he was too sick to make it to Oregon Country, even after he paid his way. If you've read any of Danek's other stories of the Nomadic Ghost, you know what follows: An intriguing tale that's hard to put down, well developed, believable, and endearing characters matched to a plot with surprising twists; and settings that bring those west-bound settlers in the path of attacking Native Americans, without relying Engrossed, stereotypes. enjoyed reading Pioneer Ghost, appreciating anew our history as well as this well-written tale.
